PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



Principal's Report

We welcome two new staff members to our school who were appointed in the middle of the Term. Justen Stoodley has worked at Jamison High School in a part time capacity as the Chaplin for a number of years. We now welcome him in a full-time role as our Student Support Officer. Justen will be working as a key member of our wellbeing team, working with counsellors and year advisers to support students, coordinating with outside agencies to support students and families and developing wellbeing programs that run in the school. We also welcome Brittany Pearce who joins our Support Faculty. Brittany brings experience of working at two comprehensive high schools and she has settled in well with the support classes. We currently have positions available for a

General Assistant and Farm Hand. At the end of the Term we will be farewell Rodney Edwards who has been working in the General Assistant Role for over two years. During that time he has been instrumental in organising and overseeing many of the school upgrades. His contributions have been significant and we wish him well in retirement.

As we approach the end of Term Two, all students will receive Academic School Reports for the Semester. These reports will show information about your child's progress across all key learning areas. I would stress to parents that connection to school, completion of tasks and attendance in class to participate in the learning activities designed by the school are the key to student success. While our school operates a flexible timetable for Years 11 and 12 students, all students in Year 7 to 10 need to be onsite by 8:25 am. Each morning students connect with their homeroom teacher, rolls are marked and important information about the organisation of the day is communicated. If a student arrives after 8:30 am then they are marked as late and a reason will need to be supplied.

At the start of this Term students in Year 7 and 9 sat the NAPLAN online tests. Following on from this we have also been working through the Minimum Standards tests for Year 10 and 11 students. The NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) has implemented the HSC minimum standard to help ensure that students have the key literacy and numeracy skills for life after school. Students in New South Wales need to demonstrate a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy to receive the HSC credential. The HSC minimum standard is set at level 3 of the Australian Core Skills Framework (ACSF). These skills are essential for everyday tasks and learning after school such as writing a letter for a job application or understanding a mobile phone plan. The standard is assessed through online tests across three areas: reading, writing and numeracy. The minimum standard online tests are 45 minutes long and include a multiple choice reading test, a multiple choice numeracy test and a short writing test based on a choice between a visual or written prompt. We are working to ensure that all students meet minimum standards and therefore qualify for the Higher School Certificate.

It was a pleasure recently to attend the Community Service Youth Award organised by Nepean Rotary. Congratulations to Tiana Harrison of Year 11 on being recognised for her efforts both at school, in school representation and student leadership as well as leadership in the community. Congratulations also to Emma Palmer on her recent involvement in both the PSSA and CHS Basketball competitions where she was a student umpire. Her performance and decision making at these carnivals saw her selected as a State Umpire representative for Basketball at a national level.

We continue to develop and implement STEM initiatives at the school. Year 7 students recently attended Sydney Zoo to study animal enclosures and then use computer programs to design animal enclosures once they were back at school. There was considerable planning to make these days possible and it involved maths and science teachers working collaboratively to plan, develop and deliver the program. This project-based learning approach, where students work collaboratively to design a solution to a real world issue, has many applications of high level science and mathematical concepts and higher order thinking skills. It was a highly valuable learning experience for our students. Our dedicated team of staff who work on the STEM initiatives ensure that Jamison is a leader in this field and offers students quality, engaging and authentic learning experiences.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT CONT.

We continue to follow COVID advice and safe operating procedures. It is still a requirement that all visitors to the school need to sign in through the front office and provide contact details. We have recently updated our sign in procedures for visitors to the school to ensure our students are safe. At this stage, even for evenings like student performances and subject selection, we require an accurate list of visitors to the school site in the event of a positive COVID case. Your ongoing cooperation in this is appreciated.

We continue with the capital upgrades at the school. The Library is now complete and has been developed further as the learning hub of the school. One side of the Library has been set up as the Senior Study. This is an area where Year 11 and 12 students attend during their study periods to get advice, study tips and tutoring from teachers.

Our bus shed is almost complete and is located on the land adjoining York Public School. When this is complete we will be able to store the bus onsite. The bus is being used more and more as restrictions are eased and extra curricula activities become available and having it available and ready will mean that we are able to offer more opportunities for students. We also expect work on the new Multi Purpose Facility to commence soon. It is likely that at the start of next term the front of the school will be fenced off as the building works get under way. There may be limited access to the school on some days through the gate directly opposite Southlands as construction gets under way.

Our School Community has an expectation that all students will wear full school uniform. With this in mind, we continue to work with families to ensure that our school uniform reflects positively on the good name of Jamison High School. Wearing uniforms enhances school pride, unity, and community spirit. School uniforms are important and keep students focused on their education, not their clothes. They also increase student safety in schools and it needs to be noted that most parents and educators support mandatory school uniforms. Now that we are well and truly into winter, it is essential that students wear the correct uniform. Hoodies and Track pants are not part of our uniform. Our policy is to change students into correct uniform if they attend and are out of uniform. Uniform items may be purchased online or at the School. The Uniform Shop opening times are Tuesday 12:30pm – 4:30pm and Friday 7:30am – 11:30am. All items are currently in stock.

On Tuesday evening, June 8 we will hold our next Parents and Citizens Association meeting. At the last meeting the P&C contributed funds towards the development of the schools fitness lab. Mr Gillett and the PDHPE Faculty have been busy developing the plan for the area and we expect to have it up and running next term.

Enjoy the upcoming holidays. Term Three resumes for staff on Monday the 12 July for our School Development Day. Students return on Tuesday 13 July.

Finally, I would like to inform our community of the sad passing of one of our School Counsellors, Ian Birrell. Ian was a valued member of the counselling team and worked with students at Jamison High School for the past two years. He was everything you would expect in a counsellor and more. He had compassion and understanding for students and made many valuable contributions to the programs at the school that support students. His advice and wise counsel provided to the wellbeing team showed the wisdom and knowledge he had gained over his many years with the Department of Education. He will be sorely missed.

Administration Reminders

Early Leavers: If students require an early leave pass, please ensure a signed note from parents/carers is presented to a Deputy Principal by 8:20am with the details of why leave is needed. Once this is completed you will be directed to the office who will issue a pass and have rolls adjusted accordingly.

If you need to collect your child from school early, please ensure that you bring ID, as we have a duty of care to ensure students leave with those nominated on contacts only. If prior arrangements regarding the leave can be organised this will minimise the wait time when arriving for pick up.

Payment reminders for Excursions: It is necessary that permission slips and payments for excursions are finalised no later than 2 days prior to the event. Year 12

Year 12 have just over 13 weeks of formal schooling before they begin their HSC Examinations. Students will sit their Trial HSC examinations commencing Monday 29 July. The Trial HSC is crucial for students as it mirrors the expectations of the HSC Examination. Most examinations are 3 hours in length and therefore require students to have the necessary knowledge and skill to use the allocated time wisely so as to achieve their best. Students should now be in a regular study pattern, practising past papers and accessing staff for feedback and advice. Year 12 will receive their Trial HSC Examination timetable shortly giving them the opportunity to use their term break to study. Many teachers avail themselves during the school holidays to run revision groups for students, whilst not compulsory, they are a valuable resource for students to build their knowledge and confidence. Year 11

Year 11 students will soon be receiving their Semester One Academic Reports. It is important for students to reflect on their results and develop strategies that will assist them in future examinations. Teachers are busy working on developing higher order thinking skills with their students and also the development of literacy through the use of ALARM (a learning and response matrix). Teachers are focusing on providing feedback to students about their writing style and suggesting areas for improvement through the submission of draft work samples. Students are also being encouraged to reflect on their own learning style and to set clear, aspirational learning goals for themselves. Students have access to their teacher mentors to assist them in this process.

Year 10 - Subject Selection for Year 11 2022

Year 10 students have now begun the process of selecting subjects and patterns of study for their Preliminary and HSC study. At Jamison High School we provide a very comprehensive Mentor program. The program involves meetings and guidance from teacher mentors and parent and student interviews to ensure that students are able to make informed choices for their interests, abilities and future directions.

Our Year 11 2022 Information Evening will be held on Tuesday 8th June in the school hall. This will allow students to attend with parents/carers to obtain vital information regarding their Senior patterns of study options. The evening will commence at 6pm. We look forward to seeing you attend this evening. Staff will be on hand to give students the opportunity to discuss course requirements and senior commitments. Thanks go to Kym McKinnon for her continued organisation of this very valuable process in particular the Subject Selection evening.

Year 9

Year students have worked well during their Assessment week and NAPLAN testing. Plans are underway for the Annual Year 9 Dinner Dance at the end of Term 3 and this will be an exciting event for our Year 9 cohort. More information to come in the coming weeks about time, date and cost.

Year 8

Year 8 have continued to have a high participation and success rate in the many carnivals and sporting events that have been held this term. This has included representative Cross Country and Athletics and has seen many of them successfully gaining a position to represent our school and the region in the Sydney West Athletics Carnival. It has also been most pleasing to see so many of this year group heavily involved in our recess and lunchtime PBL Sporting Competitions.

Year 7

With the excitement of starting at a new school and participating in activities such as Peer Support and a bush school camp for the first time all now relegated to the recent past, it is pleasing to see how the students of Year 7 have now settled into the day-to-day routine of our school. With the distribution of reports soon to take place, it will be most important for students (and their parents) to carefully read the comments that teachers have made on the challenges and achievements students have faced in the first semester and reflect on areas for improvement in the classroom in the second half of the year.

Uniform

Now that winter has made its presence clearly felt, parents and students are reminded that school jumpers, sloppy joes and jackets are available from the Uniform Shop.

We would also like to take the opportunity to remind parents and students that grey and black jumpers are not part of our uniform and are not to be worn. Garments with hoods are also not acceptable as a school jumper. Footwear must also comply with the NSW Department of Education Guidelines in relation to safety (WH&S). Students' shoes must be all black, the entire foot is to be covered by the shoe, they must have a solid sole and firm leather uppers. A full list of uniform requirements can be located in the school diary. The school also has a small stock of school jumpers/uniform items in the clothing pool.

Careers & Transition News

We have been very busy in Careers & Transition this term!

A number of Year 10 students have already organised their **work experience** for this year. They can organise their placements throughout the year as long as they do not clash with assessment weeks. They need to complete the Work Ready Certificates in the HSC 2023 Careers Google classroom before they attend their work placement.

A Year 10 into 11 Subject Selection Parent Information Evening will be held on **June 8th 2021 from 6 – 8pm**. Jamison High School offers a program to support Year 10 students and their families in making subject choices and other career decisions into Year 11 and 12. Students have received hard copies of the subject selection booklets & the subject selection sheet to start to think about possible choices. This material can also be found in the Careers Google classroom, HSC – 2023, along with much more information about choosing the best subjects for the senior years. The code for the classroom is: sjdtit2 . At the information evening students and parents will have the opportunity to discuss subject considerations and career pathway options with the various faculty staff members, the school VET programs and the Careers and Transition Advisers. Also, the SBAT (School Based Apprenticeship and Traineeship) Coordinator & EVET (External Vocational Education & Training) providers will be available to discuss their courses as well as representatives from WSU. TAFE only have virtual subject selection presentations this year on the following dates for information about TVET courses: Thursday 17 June 7.00pm – 8.00pm & Tuesday 20 July 7.00pm – 8.00pm.

The Western Sydney Careers Market was held on the 19th May at the Penrith Valley Regional Sports Centre. All the students who attended found the amount of industry representatives and information provided very helpful.

In Week 9, we are holding a 'Futures Week' which will mainly focus on Year 10. The students will participate in presentations from the Defence Force, WSU, TAFE and Verto, a group training organisation. The feature of the week is the **Inspiring the Future's Industry Networking** day on Wednesday 16th June where the students will be involved in employability skill activities and a 'speed date' style industry networking session.

On Tuesday, 1st June, all of Year 10, 11 and 12 will be participating in a workshop called The Truth Project delivered by Year 13. The workshop is a great program to help the students make educated decisions about the transition from school to work, further study and other opportunities.

We have been holding a number of university information talks during recess for interested students. Quite a few students have attended and have received valuable information from the university representatives.

ATTENDANCE MATTERS

Attendance – Every Day Counts

We wanted to share with you this graphic outlining the impact of student attendance at school. Did you know that 90% attendance equates to a month off school each year?

Regular attendance at school is fundamental to student learning. Students who attend school regularly are more likely to achieve educational success, and increase their career and life options. Poor patterns of attendance place students at risk of <u>not</u> achieving their educational, social and psychological potential and disadvantage them in the quality of choices they are able to make in later life. Jamison HS values the wellbeing of its students – this includes the attendance patterns of its students.

At Jamison HS, we promote and recognize good attendance through a system of positive rewards.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

What is my legal obligation with regard to my child attending school?

Education in NSW is compulsory. This means **all** children from 6 - 17 years of age are legally required to attend school. After Year 10 and until they turn 17 years of age students must be either:

- 1. in school
- 2. in approved education or training
- 3. in full-time, paid employment or a combination of work, education and/or training.

Do I have to send my child every day?

Yes, it is a condition of enrolment that you send your child every day. Parents are legally required to send their child to school every day that the school is open for instruction or participation. This includes attendance in school activities such as swimming and athletics carnivals.


What Do I Do If My Child Is Away From School?

Send a written explanation with your child on the day your child returns to school. This is a **legal requirement** and must occur within **seven school days.** Alternatively, you can send a reply to the SMS message you receive when your child is absent from school or submit an explanation via the Parent Portal.

What Do I Do If My Child Is Away for a Prolonged Period (more than three days) Due to Illness?

Phone the school to explain the circumstances and the expected duration. A written explanation must be supplied on the day your child returns to school.
